In 2019, we ignited a movement sparked by a staggering statistic: Black women and girls receive less than one percent of the South's \$4.8 billion in philanthropic investments. That moment was a wake-up call, compelling us to embrace our responsibility and forge pathways for those who have been systematically overlooked. We knew we had to take action, and with audacity and clarity, we set forth on a mission to raise \$100 million over the next decade, dedicated to financially empowering the aspirations of Black girls and women throughout the South; not just a goal, but as our relentless pursuit of justice and equity.

Today, we stand proud of what we've accomplished! We have successfully done our part to dismantle barriers and challenge the outdated norms of traditional grantmaking as an effort to redirect resources to uplift underfunded Black women-led organizations. To date, we have awarded \$10.2 million to 220 Black women-led organizations and empowered 800 girls across 13 southern states! Our work is further bolstered by invaluable partnerships along with a network of regional movement partners who are as passionate about this mission as we are.

From a bold vision to tangible impact, the Southern Black Girls and Women's Consortium is steadfast in our commitment to create a world where every Black girl and woman is celebrated, supported, and empowered to thrive. We are not just making dreams a reality; we are building radical futures and paving the way for generations to come—and we're just getting started!

THEY NOT LIKE US

2017

In 2017, we discovered a devastating report entitled Unequal Lives: The State of Black Women and Families in the Rural South, which confirmed that less than 1 percent of the \$4.8 billion philanthropic investments allocated to the South were focused on programs focused on Black women and girls. Most recently, this data was updated by the Ms. Foundation who confirmed that Black women and girls receive only 0.5% of \$66.9 billion from foundations, totaling just \$5.48 per woman and girl of color in the United States.

During late 2018 and early 2019, the Consortium and its Core Movement Partners conducted 29 Listening Sessions with 463 Black girls across the 12 states to learn girls' self-perceptions, their needs, their dreams for themselves, their dreams for their communities, and their need for resources. Among the top five needs/wants, the #1 need referenced by Black girls was empowerment (i.e., having the authority or the power to do something, having the knowledge, confidence, means, or ability to do things or make decisions for oneself (Merriam Webster Dictionary definition).

Startled, we recognized the urgent need to address the disinvestment in our girls and women, and immediately took on the mantle of becoming disruptors to a broken grantmaking system.

As the Anchors and their colleagues developed the Consortium, they kept in mind the needs and wants voiced by the girls. Grantmaking and programming were designed to empower, create education and learning opportunities, address physical and mental health, and foster positive relationships

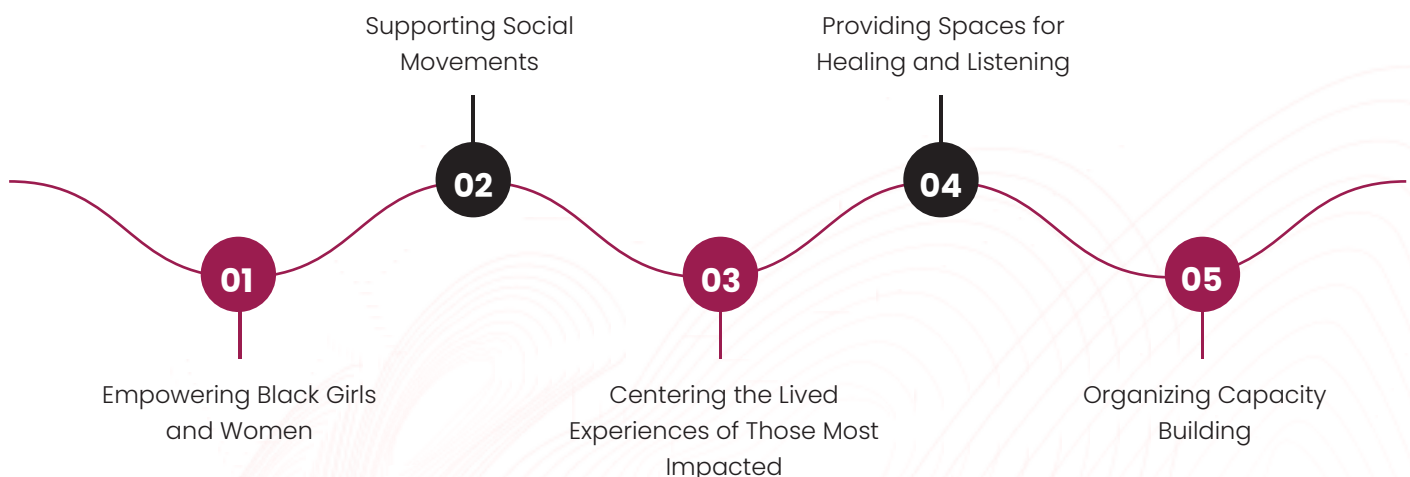

Black Girls Defense Fund

A vital discretionary resource designed to provide family and legal support for Black girls and women in need, the Black Girls Defense Fund recognizes the unique challenges faced by this community, including systemic injustices and barriers to access. By offering essential legal assistance and family support, we encourage these young women to advocate for themselves and their communities—empowering voices and protecting futures. Through this fund, we aim to ensure that every Black girl has the protection and resources necessary to thrive, allowing them to overcome obstacles and realize their potential.



Innovation Fund

The Innovation Fund is a powerful initiative that allows Black women and girls the space to dream, experiment, and innovate. By providing startup funding for small businesses led by Black girls and women, as well as financial support for new ideas, this fund acts as a catalyst for transformation. It empowers recipients to explore their entrepreneurial aspirations and develop creative solutions to pressing challenges in their communities. Through this fund, we are igniting dreams and fostering change, ensuring that the voices and visions of Black women and girls are not only heard but also realized in impactful ways.



Collaborative Partnership Philanthropy Fund

Embodying the belief that collective action leads to greater impact, the Collaborative Partnership Philanthropy Fund is a special initiative that creates opportunities for Southern Black Girls to partner with their philanthropic peers and expand efforts that focus on supporting Black women and girls as well as establishing dedicated funds for advancement. By fostering collaboration among diverse stakeholders, we leverage shared resources, expertise and networks to create sustainable change. This fund illustrates that when we unite in both purpose and mission, we amplify our efforts and drive transformative results that prove there is strength in unity and power in collaboration!



Black Girl Dream Fund

Designed to support the dreams of Black girls and women by supporting the organizations that care for girls The Black Girl Dream Fund supports education, community development, entrepreneurship, health, travel and cultural exposure, and wellness and safety.

#BLACKGIRLJOYCHALLENGE

The #BlackGirlJoyChallenge emphasizes the power of joy as a transformative force of mental health and self-care for Black girls. This initiative awards micro-grants to applicants who have innovative and impactful ideas to spread joy and positivity in their communities. Past awardees have used their grants for a wide range of joyful projects, such as hosting a drive-in movie during the COVID-19 pandemic, launching programs to combat period poverty, forming an all-Black girls robotics team, and organizing park restoration efforts. These initiatives not only uplift communities but also foster leadership, creativity, and community engagement.

As a direct result, over **800 Black girls** have received a collective **\$408,900** as **#BlackGirlJoy Challenge winners** and SBGWC has supported more than 200 girl-serving and women organizations and projects. In total, SBGWC has built an ecosystem of more than 1,000 Southern Black women leaders.

Movie and Concert Tickets

Southern Black Girls brought Joy to some of our partners and their communities by organizing special movie buyouts for the highly anticipated releases of *The Little Mermaid* and *The Color Purple*. This empowering initiative created an inclusive and celebratory space for Black Girls and Women to beloved classics reimagined. We provided 2,000 tickets across our 13 states—through our ecosystem of Black Women-led organizations. The viewing allowed us to extend our support in meaningful ways!



Our partnership with Roc Nation and the Pete and Thomas Foundation provided a unique opportunity for 300 of our Wisdom Council members and other partners in Florida, Georgia, and Tennessee to attend Grammy winning artist Alicia Keys and Megan Thee Stallion concert tours. This experience was a meaningful way to show appreciation for the tireless work supporting the application review of our funds. The events not only celebrated their efforts but also strengthened our community of changemakers across the region.

SBGWC Youth Ambassadors



Our Youth Ambassadors are the vibrant voices of our future—dynamic girls and gender-expansive youth, ages 12-24, who are instrumental in shaping the direction of the Southern Black Girls and Women’s Consortium. Through an empowering year-long leadership development program, these young leaders connect the issues affecting their schools and communities to the broader policies impacting Black girls. They champion the #BlackGirlJoyChallenge, engage in reviewing and scoring applications, and take part in selecting award winners. As passionate advocates, they significantly influence grant funding decisions and contribute to the content of our annual Southern Black Girls Conference.



Sage Circle

The Sage Circle lies at the heart of the Southern Black Girls and Women’s Consortium, serving as a monthly safe haven where Black girls and women get together to learn about a variety of topics, from mental health to grant writing. Designed to be conversational and inviting, these sessions offer valuable insights, practical information, and networking opportunities in a supportive and engaging atmosphere. The Sage Circle strengthens our SBGWC metaverse by fostering connections and equipping attendees with knowledge and resources to support their personal and professional growth.



Wisdom Council

Our Wisdom Council plays a vital role in selecting grantee partners and #BlackGirlJoyChallenge winners. This vibrant, intergenerational group of leaders spans across the 13 states served by the Southern Black Girls and Women’s Consortium, bringing together a diverse and rich tapestry of perspectives and experiences. Council members, who can be as young as 12, gain valuable expertise in movement building, advocacy, and leadership all while deepening their understanding of the unique challenges and networks within their respective states and regions. Beyond grant selection, they help shape the Consortium’s strategic direction, ensuring that our work is deeply rooted in the needs and aspirations of Black girls and women across the south.

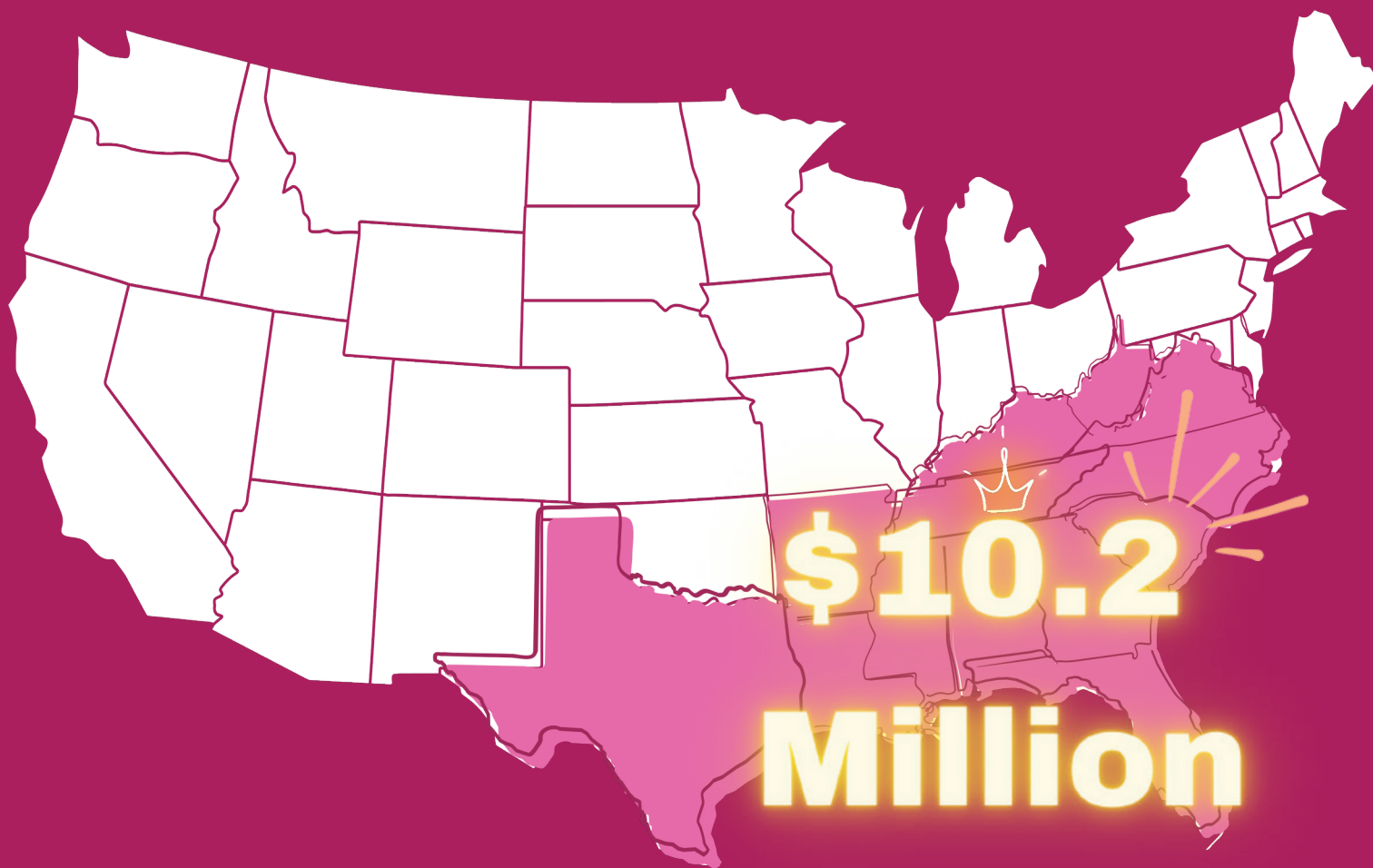


Movement Partners

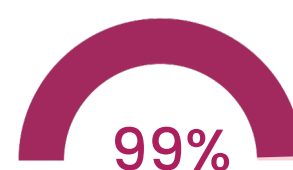

#BlackGirlJoyWinner Milan Waller

Milan, a passionate 9th grader from Atlanta, founded the Milan the Golfer Foundation to make golf accessible to urban Black girls. The foundation offers free clinics, mentorship, leadership workshops, and "Tee Time Talks," focusing on mental health and personal growth. Primarily serving Black girls in underserved communities, Milan's mission is to break financial barriers and create an inclusive space for all who love the game.



Grantee Partner Dr. Nadia Richardson

Nadia Richardson, founder of the Black Women's Mental Health Institute (BWMHI) in Birmingham, Alabama, is a passionate mental health advocate. Inspired by her personal experiences and the struggles of Black women, she established BWMHI to address gaps in culturally responsive mental health services. Through impactful programs, the institute provides free counseling, screenings, and awareness campaigns, serving over 48 cities and 32 counties across Alabama, focusing on mental health equity, suicide prevention, and gun violence support.



Grantee Partner Ciara Coleman

Ciara "CeCe" Coleman, founder of Geaux Girl Giving Collective, is transforming philanthropy in New Orleans by funding Black women-led nonprofits. Through grants and capacity-building programs, the collective has supported 39 organizations, including initiatives like the Perry Second Chances Scholarship and mental health recovery programs. Ciara also hosted the first You Geaux Girl! Summit, empowering over 50 attendees with networking opportunities.



Grantee Partner Brooke and Breanna Bennett

At just 12, Brooke Bennett learned that many girls in her community were missing school due to the inability to afford sanitary pads. This revelation inspired her and her twin sister, Breanna, to establish Women In Training, Inc. (WIT) in July 2019, a youth empowerment organization tackling period poverty and advocating for menstrual equity for Black women and girls. Since then, WIT has distributed over 30,000 WITKITS across Alabama and beyond, demonstrating that young people can create meaningful change with support from organizations like the Southern Black Girls and Women's Consortium.

YOU GLOW GIRL!

Youth Ambassador – Destiny Burse , MS

Growing up in Indianola, Mississippi, in the heart of the Mississippi Delta, I often felt overlooked and underestimated. The Delta, with its rich cultural roots and deep historical significance, is often portrayed in ways that ignore the brilliance and potential of young Black girls like me. Despite this, the Southern Black Girls and Women's Consortium (SBGWC) played a pivotal role in helping me find my voice and emerge as a confident, empowered young woman.

My journey with SBGWC began during my senior year of high school, at a time of great uncertainty due to the COVID-19 pandemic. It was a challenging period where everything around me seemed to be falling apart. However, I was introduced to the Black Girl Joy Challenge, an initiative by SBGWC that encouraged Black girls to celebrate joy in themselves and their communities, even in the face of adversity. This challenge was life-changing for me, as it helped me rediscover joy and resilience, despite the difficulties I faced.



Participating in the Black Girl Joy Challenge reignited my sense of purpose, showing me that joy is essential for overcoming challenges. It wasn't just about happiness but about rediscovering my potential and the strength of a supportive community. SBGWC taught me the power of unity and how joy fuels personal growth.

Inspired by this experience, I became a youth ambassador for SBGWC, a role that has transformed me over the past three years. Working with women dedicated to uplifting Black girls across the South has empowered me to make a real difference in my community. SBGWC's focus on resilience and empowerment has equipped me with confidence and tools to advocate for myself and others, pushing for the change we need.

The support from SBGWC has shaped my academic and professional path. As a graduate of Alcorn State University, I'm pursuing a STEM MBA, driven by their legacy of excellence. SBGWC has shown me that we are defined by our resilience, not the limitations others impose.

Looking ahead, I'm filled with hope, knowing that the foundation built through SBGWC will guide me through future challenges and opportunities. The Consortium has not only impacted my life but also created positive change in my community, proving that when Black girls are empowered, we can achieve remarkable things.



SHINE THE LIGHT ON THEM

Celebrating Global Sisterhood: The Black Women of the Global South Delegation

At the 2024 Black Girls Dream Conference, Southern Black Girls proudly hosted the “Black Women of the Global South” panel, featuring a powerful delegation of Black women leaders from across the African diaspora, supported by the Gates Foundation. These leaders, including Aline Odara (Brazil), Beatrice Gakuba (Kenya), Jacqueline Idun (U.S. & Ghana), Naana Akyaa Asante (Ghana), Coumba Toure (Senegal), Dawn Stewart (Guyana), Cynthia Ellis Topsey (Belize), and Cruz Helena Valencia Moreno (Colombia), came together to address systemic issues affecting communities of color in the Global South. They shared insights on how to dismantle barriers, drive change, and create opportunities for empowerment.

Their dialogue not only unpacked the unique challenges facing Black women and girls but also celebrated the potential for collective progress. This exchange amplified the importance of building solidarity among culturally diverse women across borders, inspiring a new generation to rise, thrive, and create lasting change. With reports confirming that Black women and girls receive less than one percent of the \$4.8 billion in philanthropic investments in the region, we have made it our mission to close this gap by providing greater resources to underfunded organizations that intentionally support and empower them.

Our goal for 2025 is to raise \$25 million as part of our SHE GOT NEXT campaign, focusing on empowering Black girls and women who are actively shaping the future.

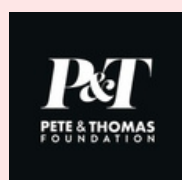
